### **AUDREA JOHNSON**

Audrea Johnson is the daughter of the late Joe L Bullard and Lorraine Bullard of Pine Bluff, AR. Born November 20, 1987. She attended Pine Bluff School District and attended UAM. Audrea is employed by the Dumas School District

She is married to Robbie Johnson Sr. Together they have 4 children. In 2016, she was diagnosed with Stage 4 Multiple Myeloma. This greatly impacted her life and her faith-walk.

By doctors' orders she stopped working in the school system but never stopped working in ministry. She is a member of Travelers Rest Missionary Baptist Church under the leadership of James Lee. She serves as an associate minister.

Mrs. Johnson is the lead singer of The Heavenly Hearts of Dumas, AR, and is the founder of Heart2Heart Ministries, a non-profit organization that reaches to hearts of the people of God by way of preaching prayer giving and helping.

Last year, she was given 6 months to live, but it's by the grace of God she is still here. She is indeed "Chosen for this". She wants her life to be a light that reflects Christ and nothing more.

### DR. JOCELYN ELDERS

Joycelyn Elders was born on August 13, 1933 in Schaal, Arkansas. She was the daughter of sharecroppers but despite growing up in poverty, she graduated as valedictorian of her high school class and became the first in her family to attend college, the first person in the state of Arkansas to become board certified in pediatric endocrinology, and the first African-American public health administrator. In 1993, she became the 15th United States Surgeon General, making her the first African American and only the second woman to hold the position. Her controversial opinions about sexual health, including her U.N. conference statements regarding masturbation, caused great controversy, and ultimately led to her forced resignation. Elders is currently a professor emerita of pediatrics at the University of Arkansas School of Medicine and participates in numerous public speaking events promoting the legalization of marijuana and improvements to sexual education and public health.

While obtaining her medical degree from the University of Arkansas and giving physical examinations to the local high school basketball team, she met her husband, Oliver Elders, who was the basketball coach. Within two months, the couple married in 1960. They have two sons, Eric, born in 1963, and Kevin, born in 1965.

#### Accomplishments

First African-American U.S. Surgeon General
In September 1993, then-president Bill Clinton appointed Elders as the 15th United States Surgeon General, making her the first African American and only the second woman (following Antonia Novello) to hold the position. During her brief time as U.S. Surgeon General, she continued her open, frank, and often controversial crusades for improving sexual health education. Elders also helped develop the Office of Adolescent Health, which is now part of the Department of Health and Human Services. She advocated for increased access to health care and assistance for drug and alcohol abuse to her list of major concerns as well as the legalization of marijuana and other drugs. On these fronts and others, Elders was

ahead of the curve on many public health issues that we have seen come to fruition today.

At a 1994 United Nations Conference, her controversial statement about masturbation as "a part of something that perhaps should be taught" to prevent the spread of HIV and AIDS among teens led to her forced resignation. After serving only 15 months as U.S. Surgeon General, Elders resigned in December 1994.

#### Lifelong Activism in Sex, Drugs, and Healthcare

During her early work as a physician and pediatric endocrinologist, Elders was treating adolescents with juvenile diabetes when she began to take notice of the extreme dangers of early pregnancy for diabetic girls. Elders then began teaching her young patients about the importance pregnancy prevention, providing them with birth control and condoms. Throughout the next several decades, she published well over a hundred papers related to juvenile diabetes and sexual behavior and dedicated her life to public health and access to sexual

In 1987, then-governor Bill Clinton appointed Elders as Director of the Arkansas Department of Health, making her the first African-American woman to hold this position. Always an advocate for adolescent health and responsible decision-making, Elders was branded a "rabble rouser" by president of the Arkansas Medical Society due to her controversial opinions on sexual education and birth control. She was even given the nickname the "condom queen" because she kept a "condom tree" on her government desk. During her time in office, she successfully reduced teen pregnancy, expanded the availability of HIV services, and worked hard to promote sex education. In 1992, she was elected President of the Association of State and Territorial Health Officers and a year later, appointed as U.S. Surgeon General. Awards

Elders is the recipient of numerous awards including the Woman of Distinction Award from Worthen Bank, the Arkansas Democrat's Woman of the Year, the National Governor's Association Distinguished Service Award, the American Medical Association's Dr. Nathan Davis Award, the De Lee Humanitarian Award, the National Coalition of 100 Black Women's Candace Award for Health Science, and the Career Development Award from the National Institute of Health. Elders was also featured in the Changing the Face of Medicine exhibition, which honors the lives and accomplishments of women in medicine, and is featured in the Arkansas Women's Hall of Fame.

In 2016, the "Joycelyn Elders Clinic" was launched by Brighter Brains Institute, a USA nonprofit, to serve students attending Garama Humanist Secondary School in the village of Kisinga, in western Uganda. In the spirit of Dr. Elders' work, the Clinic offers sex education classes, free male and female condoms, free AFRIpads (washable, reusable sanitary pads that last for one year), and medicine for common diseases (malaria, parasitic worms, peptic ulcer disease, infections, etc.).

Elders currently participates in numerous public speaking events promoting the legalization of marijuana and improvements to sexual education and public health. Elders is also active

in fight for racial equality in medicine.

#### Education

Elders was the first in her family to attend college and she did so at age 15 on an earned four-year scholarship with assistance from her brothers and sisters who picked extra cotton to help pay the \$3.83 bus fare she needed to get to school every day. In 1952, she received a B.S. in Biology from Philander Smith College in Little Rock, Arkansas. Her original plan was to become a lab technician but after hearing a speech by Edith Irby Jones, the first African-American student at the University of Arkansas School of Medicine, Elders — who hadn't even seen a doctor until she went to college — decided she wanted to become a physician "to improve the lives of children.

Elders went on to work briefly as a nurse's aide at a Veterans Administration hospital in Milwaukee and then joined the U.S. Army's Women's Medical Specialist Corps in 1953. She was the only African-American person in her class at Brooke Army Medical Center at Fort Sam Houston in San Antonio, Texas. She was stationed at Letterman Army Hospital in San Francisco, treating wounded soldiers returning home from the Korean War. In April 1954, Elders was licensed as a physical therapist and transferred to Fitzsimmons Hospital in Denver

where she treated President Dwight D. Eisenhower after his 1955 heart attack.

Discharged from the U.S. Army in 1956, Elders went on to attend the University of Arkansas Medical School with assistance from the G.I. Bill. As 1 of 3 African Americans at the time of her entry into medical school, Elders was not allowed to eat in the "whites only" cafeteria. Despite the systematic racism she experienced, Elders obtained her M.D. in 1960 and M.S. in Biochemistry in 1967. In 1978, Elders became the first person in the state of Arkansas to receive board certification as a pediatric endocrinologist. Dr. Elders graduated from the University of Arkansas Medical School and then became its first African-American resident, its first African-American chief resident, and finally its first African-American professor. Elders worked at the University of Arkansas School of Medicine as an assistant, associate, and full professor of pediatrics from the 1960s to 1987 and later returned as a professor emerita.

Elders told her life story in the autobiography, From Sharecropper's Daughter to Surgeon General of the United States of America (1997).







### HILDA B. MAY

Mrs. Hilda May was born and raised in Kinder, Louisiana, where she graduated from Carver High School. She graduated from Lane Bryant Business College in Chicago and later attended college at Mt. San Antonio College in Pomona, California. Mrs. May moved to Pine Bluff, Arkansas, from California and married Walter C. May in 1969. Together they have four children -- three sons (Walter Jr., Arnett Raphael, and Kenric Orlando—deceased) one daughter—La'Leata May-Westbrook). They were blessed to be the grand-parents of seven grandchildren and one-on- the-way—four boys (Malachi, Michael, Arnett Jr. (A.J.), and Asher. They have three girls Destiny, Cassia, Christian and a special little girl we love and consider our granddaughter too, Diamond Douglas.

It is through the grace of God who has blessed them to live long enough to see generations of young people who lovingly refer to them as Mama and Daddy or Grandma and Papa and consider them their children. They have had them in their lives for many years and now their children are a part of their lives.

Mrs. May credits God for the spiritual enrichment gained by her interaction with young people throughout their ministry. She was employed in Chicago, Illinois and Pomona, California as a financial officer. In 1972, she was employed three years at UAPB in the Student Affairs Department. She decided to further her education and matriculated at the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff and graduated in 1980 with a B. S. Degree in Accounting, and did further study at the University of Arkansas at Fayetteville.

Mrs. May was employed in the Altheimer School District for three years. Mrs. May secured employment with the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff until her retirement in 2007. Currently Mrs. May serves as President of Women's Auxiliary of the Consolidated St. Marion Baptist District Association where the objectives are to promote the gospel of Jesus Christ and advance missionary work, Christian education, and to help encourage in the enlistment of young people in the Christian work in our district churches. Additionally, the Women's Auxiliary serves as a teaching tool and informational outlet for women in areas relating to health, family, finances, Christ centered living, social and community activism and dedication to their local Church families while adhering to the Great Commission Matt. 28:19-20.

Mrs. May is a member of the Kings Highway Missionary Baptist Church where she serves as Sunday School Teacher (Class 7) and Teacher for Midday Bible Study. She also serves as Advisor to the Women's Missionary Society and Christian Education Department. Married to Rev. Walter C. May, Sr. for forty-eight year, together they have served the Kings Highway congregation for 24 years as Pastor and wife until his death in 2018.

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Being conceived only 1 month after the birth of her brother, Crystal's life began on the wrong foot. Around age 8, her father (Hero) left the home. Devasted she continued on being the sassy and smart little girl she had always been. At age 10 she was molested by a family member and age 12 she was raped by a family friend. By this time, she came to a startling conclusion, every man that should have protected her harmed her in some way. The vengeance of scorned began. At age 13, trying to battle doing the right thing, she then determined that suicide was her best bet. After many failed attempts, she decided sex would ease her pain. Crystal at the age of 14 became very promiscuous. By age 16, she became pregnant and dropped out of school.

The lifeline from God began! Crystal's mom worked for a lawyer who refused to let that be the end of Crystal. He went to court and filed for her to but court ordered to take GED classes and he won. Upon starting classes, the teacher noticed that Crystal wasn't just smart, she was extraordinarily smart. So because Crystal was about 7 months pregnant she didn't want to wait. She signed off for Crystal to take the official GED test and Crystal passed and received a scholarship to start classes at Mid-South Community College. Still confused and still lost Crystal went to class and received her CNA License then followed by CDA License and currently 30 hours away from Graduating from her Bachelor's in Business with a minor in Non-Profit work.

So many people tried to help along her journey. Prior to her daughter's birth, Mrs. Linda Fields, Mrs. Kelly Moore, Mrs. Langford, Mr. and Mrs. Gray, Coach Ball, Dr. Palmer Quarrells, Mr. & Mrs. Stringfellow, Dr. Lonnie Williams, Mrs. Barbara Reid, and all of Y.O.U youth camp. After birthing her daughter, Crystal realize she had to want help. She finally prayed that God would help her to protect her daughter. At this stage in her life, she thanks her parents David Bohanon and Lavel Weatherspoon. Her brother David Weatherspoon and her other siblings. Her best friends Kesha Brewer and Linda Roberts. Her A-Team partner Casie Weatherspoon. Next are the MVPs in her life because only God knows the value of their help in her journey to recovery both naturally and spiritually. 
MYRA L. SUMMERS-WOOLFOLK, MS, LADAC, CSA &

DR. JOHN W. MILLER JR., LMSW

Originally from Moncks Corner, SC, Dr. John W. Miller Jr. is an Associate Professor of Social Work at the University of Arkansas at Little Rock. He has been a member of the UALR School of Social Work faculty since 2007, and teaches students in both the Master of Social Work and Bachelors of Social Work programs. Additionally, Dr. Miller was selected as the inaugural UALR Faculty Fellow from 2014-2016. In that role he led strategic campus initiatives focused primarily on faculty development and student success initiatives. Dr. Miller currently serves as the UALR Faculty Mentoring Program Coordinator where he connects faculty members across tenure-track ranks (from Assistant to Full Professor) to help assist junior faculty members receive mentoring from senior faculty. Dr. Miller received his Bachelor of Arts Degree in Experimental Psychology and his Master of Social Work degrees from the University of South Carolina. He earned his PhD in Social Work from The University of Tennessee.

Dr. Miller's work has yielded a host of publications. Most recently, Dr. Miller has published his first textbook, African American Perspectives: Matters of Consideration for Social Work Practice. From 2012 to 2017 Dr. Miller led the 100 Black Men of Greater Little Rock as Chapter President. Under his leadership the organization focused on mentoring and education initiatives that specifically targeted underserved populations. Since 2012 the chapter has partnered with Romine Elementary School to lead a 2nd Grade literacy initiative where the men of the 100 read to each 2nd grade class every Friday morning for 30 minutes. In 2013 the 100 partnered with the City of Little Rock to build a bookcase and purchase a library of African American themed child literature to donate to Romine's school library. To date, over 200 children have received mentoring from the men of the 100 through this initiative. The LRSD Volunteers in Public Schools (ViPs) recognized the work of the 100 at Romine Elementary by selecting the chapter as a recipient of the 2015 Community Resource Award. In 2012 the 100 also created the 100 Academy Mentoring Program. The "100 Academy" is an 8 Week intensive mentoring program that is designed for young men between the ages of 13 and 17. In 5 years, 93 young men have graduated from the program and successfully completed their SMART (Success, Motivation, Academics, Respect & Trust) curriculum design.

The 100 Academy Mentoring Program is offered to the mentees without any costs associated with the program. All that is required is their participation and best effort. In return, the chapter strives to give each young man hope for a brighter future and raised expectations for what it means to be a successful Black man in the 21st Century. They expect their young men to graduate from high school and then go on to attend college, trade school, or begin a military service career. In short, they hope that they young men they mentor go on to be the leaders of the future. The chapter motto of the 100 Black Men of Greater Little Rock is "What they see is what they'll be." Their goal is to epitomize this by providing quality mentoring to each young person they encounter.







### **BRANDI RODGERS, LCSW**

Brandi Rodgers is a mental health therapist (licensed certified social worker) and owner of Because You Matter Counseling PLLC located in Conway, Arkansas. She is responsible for providing outpatient therapy services with a personal goal to work in a partnership with individuals to assist them in recognizing their own strengths, self worth, and resilience to promote growth and positive changes. She has over 10 years of experience providing mental health services addressing a wide range of emotional and behavioral challenges including: past hurts (trauma), substance use, depression, anger, anxiety, self destructive behavior, substance use, loss of touch with reality, relationship issues, and coping with life changes. Brandi also serves as an adjunct instructor in the social work program at the University of Arkansas at Little Rock. 
